- 6. Volunteer to coach/conduct music rehearsals at the local public school.
- 7. Attend as many concerts as you can.
- 8. Compose a short holiday, folk, or classical song.
- Record video/audio excerpts of your major instrument/voice in preparation for placement in your e-portfolio.
