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This month's "Fox Finds" - MuseScore, Noteflight, and the latest Zoom hacks

For my entire career, I used the comprehensive, complex (and sometimes confusing) stand-alone notation program *Finale* to create and edit sheet music manuscripts of my compositions, excerpts, arrangements, scales and exercises, etc. To help students master the art of transposition and deal with the occasional lacking instrumentation for pit orchestra scores, we learned how to scan and create PDFs of music and export/translate them into a sax



replacement of a missing viola part or substitute something else for the horn 2 book. Now there are "share and compare" communities with web-based software - empowering your studio/school students to explore their own solutions and make their own music.

Noteflight is an online music writing application that lets you create, view, print and hear professional quality music notation right in your web browser. It is a part of the *MusicFirst Classroom* package or you can sign-up for the free-trial offer or purchase

one of the premium versions of Noteflight. (See different Noteflight plans!) Teachers and students alike can participate in open forums and view scores shared with the entire Noteflight community. The customizable menus (score, edit, duration, rhythm, pitch, tempo, etc.) are intuitive and had a "quick and easy" learning curve. (Yes, I tested it firsthand!)





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Another interesting app worth looking into is *MuseScore*, which also allows for composing, arranging, printing, playing, and up- or downloading music. *MuseScore* software is open/free-sourced and everything on musescore.org is unrestricted. However, downloading music from musescore.com is not free anymore due copyright issues. (Artists now receive royalties for their creative content.) Separate from these, there is a website for sharing scores called

msuescore.com. It provides some features free to all, others require an account - with both paid and complimentary versions of the annual subscription.

For my community/youth orchestra's online academy now underway, I combined the use of both the *MuseScore* community of freelancers and *Noteflight*. We search for several unusual arrangements in *MuseScore* (like a version of the "Bach Fugue in g minor" or the "Fun Duet for Piccolo and Tuba"), downloaded them as music xml files, and uploaded them into *Noteflight*. Through an exploration of the "menus and methods" in *Noteflight*, the players were able to arrange, print, play, and record for their own instrument.

To "get your feet wet" and for more information, I recommend viewing the excellent website of *Learning MuseScore* at <u>https://musescore.org/en/handbook/learning-musescore</u> and the myriad of YouTube videos on *Noteflight* beginning at <u>https://youtu.be/eZ3yHvFhH-k</u>.

Something just for fun... but don't show to your students! When my wife and I started doing Zoom meetings and virtual rehearsals with our orchestra members and private students, we never realized you had to deliver a full lesson on "online etiquette!" I can only imagine what our full-time colleagues are going through trying to "engage" their students via remote learning classrooms. There even seems to be a counterculture of people suggesting how to "fake" Zoom meetings, pretending they have connectivity issues (see cartoon on page one), or hacking communications. Did you

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Book-of-the-month: Life Is in the Transitions

Every now and again a book comes along that you wish you had the inspiration or knowledge to have written, like *Life Is in the Transitions - Mastering Change at Any Age* by Bruce Feiler (Penguin Press 2020)

The description printed on the front flap probably best defines the author's history, motivation, mission, and approach for the book:

> Bruce Feiler, author of the New York Times bestsellers The Secrets of Happy Families and Council of Dads, has long explored the stories that give our lives meaning. Galvanized by a personal crisis, he spent the last few years crisscrossing the country, collecting hundreds of life stories in all 50 states from Americans who'd been through major life changes from losing jobs to losing love ones; from changing careers to changing relationships; from getting sober to getting healthy to simply looking for a fresh start. He then spent a year coding these stories, identifying patterns and takeaways that can help all of us survive and thrive in times of change.

What Feiler discovered was a world in which transitions are becoming more plentiful and mastering



the skills to manage them is more urgent for all of us. The idea that we will have one job, one relationship, one source of happiness is hopelessly outdated. We all feel unnerved by this upheaval. We're concerned that our lives are not what we expected, that we've veered off course, living life out of order. But we're not alone.

Life is in the transitions introduces the fresh, illuminating vision of the nonlinear life, in which each of us faces dozens of disruptors. One in ten of those becomes what Feiler calls a lifequake, a massive change that leads to a life transition. The average length of these transitions is five years. The upshot: we all spent half of our lives in this unsettled state. You or someone you know is going through one now.

My perspective? This couldn't be more appropriate wisdom for all of us to consume and consider during this "time of the pandemic!" Just because we have retired or soon plan to leave the stress of our full-time job does not mean we are not facing many of these challenges, similar to those I recall were discussed by another author, Gail Sheehy in *Passages*, defined as "predictable crises of adult life."
