Thanks to large part of the efforts of PMEA Director of Public and Government Affairs Mark Despotakis, R3 has a new face look. Here was his "relaunch of R3" message in the October 2023 *PMEA Digital News*:

We are excited to be re-launching the PMEA Retired Resource Registry! The new version of the R3 will make it easier for retired members to keep information current in the registry and it will be easier for PMEA members to search the directory to find assistance.

PMEA values the vast wealth of experience and contributions of our retired members. The R3 celebrates the unique gifts and professional achievements of our retired members while offering service to PMEA members needing assistance in a variety of areas.

How does this process work? I will give you a "real live" example.

Say a PMEA member like Suellen Englehard needs some music coaching help. This is from a recently received email sent to me by the Sto-Rox JSHS teacher:

I am looking for people to volunteer to run sectional practice with my middle school students. Their class meets every day at 8:58-9:39. These kids have very little experience and I need some "experts" to work with them in small groups. We don't have a beginning band class for middle school and some of these kids have never played before. They could come 1-2 times a week during that time to work with them. I would love to have a trumpet, low brass, clarinet, and flute sectionals. They are the groups that need help the most.

Once all our retirees complete their profiles following the "How to R3" instructions above, PMEA will be able to share a list of qualified and interested candidates for Suellen to contact. Under the "Focus Area" menu on the PMEA website, a search could be narrowed by selecting the teaching areas, levels, PMEA District or city, and types of volunteer jobs retirees have indicated their interest.

Numerous other scenarios could be imagined. In the past, repertoire or music lesson advice, potential guest conductors, festival chaperones, audition screeners, presenters for regional workshops, etc. have been "found" on the R3.






Soon-to-Retire Corner – Book Review

Most of my PMEA book reviews offer advice to help a newly retired (or soon-to-retire) person to self-reinvent, find his or her own purpose, structure, or community towards “living the dream” in post-employment. Frankly, for the “big money” issues – investment and estate planning – I would expect you would consult a full-blown financial counselor or even an elder-law attorney. In other words, “you get what you pay for...” I would not rely on a single book to set-up my “retirement plan,” deal with taxes, nor choose the right investment strategies. But, perhaps one source might be high on my list as an exception...

The author maintains that what is coming will be challenging but he is positive that he has a few remedies for you to consider. “My goal is to help you get ahead of these changes so that you can increase your financial security and independence at a time when others are worrying. I believe that there are solutions and responses to the concerns that I’ve identified. By solutions, I don’t mean dramatic actions by Congress or regulators, though some such actions would help. Rather, I present practical actions that you can take, and I discussed them in clear and easy-to-understand terms.
