

Soon-to-Retire/Just-Retired Corner The Wisdom of Morrie – Living and Aging Creatively & Joyfully

One of my favorite times at the conference is presenting the session for soon-to-retire members and swap tales and catch-up with those who have already "Crossed the Rubicon." In Erie, we will convene together after the retired member breakfast (8:30) and do the Retirement 101 worship (10 a.m.) on Friday morning, April 18. Since I have embraced my own "retirement" (perhaps a better term for it would be "refirement" or "rewirement!") with open arms and feel the future of post-full-time employment life is bright, I love sharing those strategies and stories of happy transitions to "living the dream." If ever there was a fellow writer who has adopted my philosophy for "living and aging creatively joyfully," it is Morrie Schwartz. In his *The Wisdom of Morrie* book (based on the multimillion-copy bestseller *Tuesdays with Morrie* by Mitch Albom), you will be treated to thoughtful inspiration and a "voice" that masterfully frames "the gift of aging" as referred to by Harvard Professor Arthur C. Brooks.

It's time for a little reflection! Have you ever done the mental exercise of writing your own obituary or epitaph? What do you want to be remembered for? Well, in his book, Morrie stirs up some deep thinking on these essential questions:

- Who am I really?
- What have I done?
- What is important and meaningful to me?
- What difference does it make that I have lived?
- What does it mean to be truly human, and where am I on that scale?

This will not be a quick read. In fact, I can hardly give it justice to break down all the excellent sections and dive deeply into a meaningful analysis of the book. You have to put this on your bed stand and take time to consume these chapters:

- 1. Awakening
- 2. The Emotional Balancing Act
- 3. Combining Opposite Orientations
- 4. Expanding Our Awareness
- 5. Ageism and Age-Casting

- 6. Issues in Later Life
- 7. Coming to Terms
- 8. Aging Well
- 9. Becoming the Best Person You Can Be

proaching those diametrically opposed extremes of hope an

One of my favorite sections is his depiction of opposites, approaching those diametrically opposed extremes of hope and despair. One of the biggest challenges in our transition to retirement is self-reinvention. After the job (which consumed a large portion of our life), we must feel like we still matter, are needed, and have purpose. Morrie is not convinced that "hope springs eternal." Instead, he presents comparative charts (could be used as scaled rubrics) that contrast the differences between feelings of hope vs. hopelessness during our life passages (a few excerpts of retiree SEL):

HOPE

I haven't had enough of life. I want more. My life is not over!

I can manage and stay in control.

It's never too late to start something new. I try to expand my interest in pursuits.

I feel vital, energetic, and enthusiastic.

I can't wait to get up in the morning and get involved in a project I've been working on.

DESPAIR

I've had enough and I'm ready to give up. I feel my life is over!

I feel overwhelmed!

It's too late for anything and everything. I live dayby-day with no direction and nothing to do.

I feel old, tired, spent, and depressed.

Oh, God, how I hate to get up and face the day. Let me sleep a little longer.

To quote author Deepak Chopra from the front cover: "Beautiful... Those lucky enough to read this book will be inspired." If you are within a year of retirement or have already made this journey, run don't walk to the bookstore and get yours!

The Retirement Prep "Toolbox " - Sharing Our Evolving "Secrets of Success"



Masterful "Musical Marketer" - Spotlight on (un)Retired Member Mark Jelinek



Dozen Golden Rules for Ensemble Playing

https://elliott-randall.com/2011/06/golden-rules-for-ensemble-playing/

- 1. Everyone should play the same piece.
- Stop at every repeat sign and discuss in detail whether to take the repeat or not. The audience will love this a lot.
- 3. If you play a wrong note, give a nasty look to one of your partners.
- Keep your fingering chart handy. You can always catch up with others.
- Carefully tune your instrument before playing. That way you can play out of tune all night with a clear conscience.
- 6. Take your time turning pages.
- 7. The right note at the wrong time is a wrong note (and vice versa).
- If everyone gets lost except you, follow those who get lost.
- Strive to get the maximum NPS (note per second). That way you gain the admiration of the incompetent.
- 10. Markings for slurs, dynamics and ornaments should not be observed. They are only there to embellish the score.
- If a passage is difficult, slow down. If it's easy, speed it up. Everything will work itself out in the end.
- 12. If you are completely lost, stop everyone and say, "I think we should tune."


