guest panel for the 2025 PMEA Annual Conference: We are "REWIREES (love the word - should go into Webster's!). I have already told people who ask me if I'm retired that I'm REWIRED!"

According to co-authors Jeri Sedlar and Rick Miners in their book *Don't Retire, Rewire*, there are five steps to the process of transitioning to postemployment self-reinvention:

- 2. Identifying your "drivers."
- 3. Linking the drivers to your activities.
- 4. Creating your rewired vision.

work is on "the aspect of retirement most people either ignore or can't face: what will I do, and how will I manage my time when I am no longer working?"

Besides, "retired" is an awful word and frankly should be... retired. The average educator can leave the workforce before his or her magic Social Security age and launch new goals or venture into other pursuits and pastimes. Besides "rewired," perhaps we should use the terms "refired," "new beginnings," "encore career," or "next chapter" – portraying a journey to unique pathways, and for most of us, a state of flux, exploration, opportunities for retooling/retraining, and change!

96-year-old Mt. Lebanon, PA resident Louis Munkachy passed away peacefully on Tuesday, April 8, 2025.

One of Louis's defining characteristics was his passion for music, which began in his native Hungary. After graduating from the renowned Liszt Academy of Music, he rose to become a conductor of the prestigious Hungarian Union Choir. When the Soviet Union invaded Hungary in 1956, Louis and his wife, Emily, fled to the United States with their one-year-old son, George, in search of freedom and opportunity. After arriving in America, Louis worked tirelessly in many jobs to provide for his family, including at a cabinet shop and as a night watchman.

Music remained at the core of his being, and finally, he landed an audition at Duquesne University's

Department of Music, where the faculty immediately recognized his talent and admitted him into the graduate program with a full scholarship. He went on to earn a PhD in music education and became a distinguished professor of music at Duquesne, dedicating three decades to teaching and mentoring students. He was deeply respected and loved by students and colleagues alike, and his legacy lives on in the many he encouraged and inspired along the way.

Outside the classroom, Louis brought his musical gifts to the community, most notably as the longtime choir director at Saint Bernard's Church.

A memorial service to celebrate Louis's life will be held at a later date. Instead of flowers, the family requests donations to the Pittsburgh Opera or the Pittsburgh Symphony in honor of Louis's lifelong devotion to sharing music and culture.
